Ebenezer Church in 2006

One question often asked by visitors to Ebenezer Church is "Do you still hold church services?" Yes, we do. Ebenezer Church, the oldest existing church, is still a 'living' church. Our minister, Rev. Grant Bilbey, conducts services each Sunday – 8.30am at Ebenezer, 10.00am at Pitt Town. Baptisms are often part of the service, the recipients being children of district residents or descendants of church pioneer families. The church is also a popular venue for weddings.

A major focus of church members is the sharing of the story of Ebenezer Church with visitors and to provide a tourist location that is both caring and educational. This is done through the activities of the shop in the Schoolmaster's House beside the church. Our volunteers keep the shop open daily, except for Good Friday and a few days near Christmas, and have been doing so continuously since December 1989. Visitors may enjoy devonshire teas and purchase locally made jams, craft, souvenirs and books. Visiting coach groups may book in for teas and lunches and an historical talk.

Other church activities include monthly family/children's services, Fellowship, Youth Group, KUCA Club, Scripture in Schools, a Spring Fair and annual Pilgrimage.

Extension of Ministry

Rev. Grant Bilbey's period of ministry at Ebenezer Pitt Town began in October 1996 and ends in October this year. However an application has been made to the Nepean Presbyterian of the Uniting Church to extend this time by three to four years. The main reason for doing this, besides the fact that Grant Bilbey enjoys wide support from the congregation, is the bicentenary of the church in 2009. The congregation feels that planning for such an event will be delayed by at least 12 months if a change of ministers is to occur before 2009. A reply is expected soon.

Bicentenary of Ebenezer Church

The date chosen for the major day of celebration of the bicentenary of Ebenezer Church is **Saturday 20 June 2009**

It is probable that other events will be held leading up to 20 June 2009.

Our Church Council is seeking assistance in planning and staging this historic event. An organising committee will be formed by the end of this year. Ideas for displays, re-enactments, activities ... names of people/associations that you feel are capable of making a worthwhile contribution... are welcome.

Ebenezer Church 'Towards 2009' Bicentennial Appeal


The congregation wishes to have the church and its associated buildings in good shape for this occasion, the beginning of its third century.

Much restoration has been achieved over the last fifteen years, mainly by means of fundraising by the current congregation and also by donations. The church floor has been replaced, windows have been restored, the pavilion floor has been levelled, boundary fences have been renewed, unsightly electricity poles have been removed from church grounds and additional land has been purchased near the church to provide a buffer zone from future development. This has been a mammoth effort when you consider that the church has a small congregation in comparison to earlier years.

Work needed on church property includes...

- Repairs to the church roof and the mortar on the external walls.
- Guttering and internal refurbishing of the vestry
- The nearby Schoolmaster's House is in need of internal painting and restoration work to the upstairs rooms.
- Restoration of the baker's oven is a project that would add interest to a visit to the historic precinct of the church.
- Repairs to the roof of the pavilion (church hall).
- New toilet facilities were also needed and now have been constructed.

For all of this work to be completed \$220,000 is needed. An appeal was launched in June 2005.



How are we progressing?

Of the \$220,000 needed, \$114,000 has been achieved. This includes a grant of \$33,000 from the Federal Government.

Also, a new amenities block has now been completed (see report next page).

So that Ebenezer Church will be in good shape for the beginning of its third century the appeal remains open for donations.

CONSTRUCTION OF NEW AMENITIES

Our first project in our *Towards 2009* Renovations Program was the construction of a new amenities block. Our starting point was a photograph that we had found in 1989 in the National Library. It shows that there were once three timber slab buildings on the church property. With the assistance of architects Louise Ommundsen and Rolfe Chrystal, a similar building was designed and approved by the NSW Heritage Office and Hawkesbury City Council.

Work began in August 2005. The project was under the supervision of the church Property & Finance Committee. Finance was obtained from church fund raising, donations, a \$33,000 grant from the Federal Government and a loan from the NSW Synod of the Uniting Church.

COMPLETION OF PROJECT

Despite the rain on the morning of Saturday 15 July there was a great response with at least 100 people turning up for a morning tea to mark the completion of this project. It was an indication of the support we have experienced and an opportunity to thank everyone who had helped on the way.


And what support we experienced! There was the help from the local community – a concreter, an electrician, a construction engineer, a roofer, earth-suppliers, our local hardware store H.R.King & Sons, operators of backhoes, bobcats, ...local tradesmen who have completed the work for only the cost of materials or at no cost at all. Many are people who have been involved over the years in other Ebenezer community projects including a new fire shed, a training/meeting room at the fire shed, a tennis/netball court at Ebenezer Public School and new floors for the church and pavilion.

Current church members also played their part. The church Property & Finance Committee was 'the builder' and members led by Bob Palmer provided support where and when they could. In this way considerable savings were made.

Through the launching of our *Towards 2009* Bicentenary Appeal we obtained financial support from church members, descendants of pioneer families and past members and ministers, visitors to the site and the general community. MP Kerry Bartlett supported an application for a grant and the UCA Synod (NSW) approved a loan at favourable interest rates. All of these people are thanked for their help.

This project...

- has been completed well within budget
- has made the congregation realise that they are not alone in their desire to get all Ebenezer Church property up to a high standard of maintenance by 2009
- has enhanced the commitment of the congregation, through the operations of the church shop, to share the story of Ebenezer Church, a story that is an important part of our national Christian heritage.


