
THE SCHOOLMASTER'S HOUSE

Volunteers keep the shop in the Schoolmaster's House beside Ebenezer Church open daily, except for Good Friday and a few days near Christmas. Visitors may enjoy devonshire teas and purchase locally made jams, craft, souvenirs and family history books. Coach groups need to make bookings for teas, lunches and historical talks. In June 2006 the church site was upgraded by completing new toilet facilities and landscaping church grounds. In the six month period following there was a noticeable increase in visitors and coach groups. When compared to the same period of the previous year, shop takings increased by 38%!

Ebenezer Church 'Towards 2009' Bicentennial Appeal



An appeal to fund full restoration of all church buildings by 2009 was launched in June 2005. It was envisaged that \$220,000 was needed.

At the time of our first newsletter in August 2006 a total of \$114,000 had been received. Since then another \$44,000 has been donated, bringing the total to \$158,000. While the greater part of this increase has been made by Malcolm Turnbull, a descendant of Ann & John Turnbull, smaller donations have certainly accumulated to bring about this excellent progress. *Still some way to reach our goal* but with continuing support it appears achievable.

Our sincere thanks to everyone who has made a donation – your action has certainly given encouragement to our congregation who are daily involved in fund raising through catering and sales from the church shop.

MP's Ebenezer Pilgrimage By Louise McMahon


Ebenezer is a world away from the eastern suburbs of Sydney, but for visiting Wentworth MP Malcolm Turnbull it's a home of sorts.

Mr Turnbull made a special visit on Monday afternoon to the graveyard of Ebenezer Church where many of his colonial forebears have been laid to rest.

However this visit, one of many over the years, was marked by a generous personal contribution of \$35,000 to the Ebenezer Church 'Towards 2009' Bicentennial Appeal.

"It's impressive to see the work that has been achieved at the church as part of the restoration for the 2009 bicentenary," Mr Turnbull told The Gazette.

Mr Turnbull is a descendant of Coromandel pioneer John Turnbull, who settled at Swallow Rock Reach on the Hawkesbury River in 1803.

John and his wife Ann migrated on the ship 'Coromandel' in

1802. The Turnbulls were one of eight families that had worshipped in the same church in London and had applied to be settled together in Australia.

Mr Turnbull recalls visiting Ebenezer Church as a child and is well versed in both the history of the church and his family's affiliations with it for more than two centuries.

When Governor Bligh was deposed by the military in January 1808, John Turnbull joined other Portland Head settlers in signing a petition to have Bligh re-instated. When his wife Ann gave birth to a son in June the same year, he was named William Bligh Turnbull in memory of the governor, a practice that has been continued with generations of Turnbulls.

"This keeps our family history alive. The Turnbulls were strong supporters of Governor William Bligh," Mr Turnbull said. With his visit of a personal nature, he casually side-stepped questions of about politics, instead engrossing himself in a cup of tea and a scone while chatting about Hawkesbury colonial history with Ebenezer Church volunteers.

Mr Turnbull went on to inspect the church and to discuss the conservation of church buildings with Rev. Grant Bilbey. The church is hoping to raise \$220,000 to fund its restoration program in the lead-up to the 2009 bicentenary.

Crown Court Church of Scotland Covent Garden, London


The Ebenezer Church pioneers who came to the colony on the ship the Coromandel were members of the congregation of Crown Court Church of Scotland in Covent Garden, London, when they decided in 1801 to migrate to New South Wales.

In our recent trip to the UK, Sue and I had three days between tours to explore London and one of our goals was to visit the Crown Court Church.

It was a Sunday when we took a bus to Covent Garden. The area had a real buzz about it – markets, outdoor entertainment, a noisy excited gathering of young adults waiting to gain entrance to a theatre (which turned out to be the English version of the Australian church Hillsong!),...

It was not easy to find the church as it is tucked away in a block of buildings. The two church entrances are inconspicuous as they are doorways set amongst shop fronts, one in Russell Street and the other a side entrance from a lane called Crown Court.

The Russell Street entrance was locked but we were invited in via the side entrance by a Korean group who were preparing for a service.



On the back wall Sue found a plaque which read:

'In recollection of the Elder James Mein, Seat Holder of Crown Court Church ..., Founding Pastor of Ebenezer Church...the first Presbyterian Church in Australia.'

In 2006 Crown Court Church had 350 members and a thriving crêche and Sunday School. Dating from 1711, it is the longest established Presbyterian Church south of the Scottish border.

Joe McKenzie was a descendant of Robert McKenzie, a sealer who was marooned on Secretary Island, New Zealand, and rescued by Captain John Grono.'





Two interesting connections...

- → A lady registering to receive this newsletter told us that her son and his fiancée were looking for a church for their approaching marriage. Of all the churches in the districts around St Marys (NSW) they chose Ebenezer Church, a church with which they believed they had no connection. That was before the groom's mother started researching her family tree only to find that she was a descendant of Ebenezer Church pioneers William & Sarah Stubbs!
- → The wife of a country Rotarian on an inter-club visit to the Hawkesbury wished that the three-day visit was on another weekend as it clashed with a course on researching family history. During a talk in Ebenezer on the history of the church she became particularly interested when church school teacher Matthew McFetridge was mentioned, McFetridge being a family name. Some frantic research followed on the internet, resulting in Matthew McFetridge being a direct ancestor and, by the next weekend, a return to Ebenezer and three generations of the family having photos taken beside the McFetridge tombstones.
