It is pleasing to see the response to our church newsletters. Addresses currently amount to 367 postal and 180 email and many recipients are forwarding the newsletter to family members and family associations.

Interest in the approaching church bicentenary and support for our efforts to have church buildings and grounds fully restored by 2009 are being shown in several ways.

There have been donations towards the restoration appeal and newsletter costs. Geoff, a Turnbull descendant in Victoria, is setting up an Ebenezer Church website and will host it for two years at no cost to the church. Ray, a Johnston descendant who lives an hour's drive away, is assisting with working bees on church grounds. There have also been offers to update our records of weddings, baptisms and burials and to assist with archival material.

Family re-unions have been revived. The Grono family met in May 2007 and plan to meet again in May 2009. A Johnston family re-union will be held in September 2008. The Stubbs have met annually for many years, their next re-union being on 27 October 2007.

Also, the book 'A Colonial Churchyard' has sold well and comments have been positive.

Thank you, everyone, for your support – it is most encouraging.

A Message from the Minister

In an earlier edition of the church booklet on the history of Ebenezer Church, Rev. George Reid wrote about the character of the church pioneers.

He found them to be 'no mere adventurers... they were honest, virile, brave, God-fearing folk, small farmers, sailors, artisans or shopkeepers, mostly comparatively poor, none of them reared in the lap of luxury or idleness. They were frugal, hard-working,

They brought with them their religious principles, their desire for education and their love of good government. Several of them were afterwards entrusted with public duties of considerable responsibility.'

The fact that Ebenezer Church has functioned continuously for such a long period of time and that so many pioneer descendants have excelled in their private and public lives is evidence that these fine qualities of the pioneers have been passed on to church members and descendants.

T.S. Elliott once said, 'The historical sense involves a perception, not only of the pastness, but also of its presence.' As we move towards the bicentenary of Ebenezer Church we are reminded then of the impact that the church pioneers had on the development of the Hawkesbury district and the infant colony of New South Wales, an impact which serves as an inspiration to all people today.

Ebenezer Church 'Towards 2009' Bicentennial Appeal

Progress of our church appeal to fund full restoration of all church buildings by 2009 has slowed considerably but is still growing.

When the appeal was launched in June 2005 it was envisaged that \$220,000 was needed. The appeal has now reached \$161,000. Donations have come from several directions...from descendants of church pioneers and past ministers, past members, a government grant, fund raising by the current congregation and visitors to Ebenezer Church. We are grateful to the Ebenezer Craft Group who have now raised over \$2000.

Still some way to reach our goal but with continuing support it appears achievable.

On Sunday 6th May 2007 the Grono Family Association held a Reunion at Ebenezer Uniting Church.

Attendance was high with all but one branch of the Grono Family represented. One hundred and fifty people



gathered to celebrate the 208th anniversary of the arrival of John and Elizabeth Grono and family to Australia on the *HMS Buffalo* and the 200th anniversary of the arrival of David Hartley to Australia on the *Duke of Portland* in 1807.

The day commenced with registration at 10.00am, followed by the Official Welcome and Book Launch of 'John Grono 1767 – 1847: Our Old Colonial Neptune', written by Robert Taylor (*Photo left*) and edited by Karen Mills. The Grono Family Association presented Robert Taylor with an Honorary Life Membership recognising Robert's research on John Grono and his efforts in establishing the Grono Family Association. At 2.00pm Reverend Grant Bilby, Minister of Ebenezer & Pitt Town Uniting Churches, conducted a

Blessing Service.

Through out the day maps were available for self-guided tours of Ebenezer Church and grounds, and a display of Grono Family information was set out in the hall. Stage 2 of Renovations

The second stage of our renovation program has commenced with the installation of new guttering and downpipes on all three buildings. The next focus will be the roofs of both the vestry and church. Also, the area around the Bread Oven has been cleared, levelled and made ready for paving and the erection of a protective fence and information board.

The Bread Oven

Just below the Schoolmaster's House are the remains of the bread oven. For many years the bread oven has been remembered as shown in the photograph on the right. It was basically a rectangular, sandstone structure with a single chamber on the side facing the river.

In the early years of the history of the church school several pupils actually resided at the school in the care of the teacher and his wife. They did this because of the distance they had to travel to school and because of their fear of the Aboriginal people. There was always the possibility too that, in skirting around the farms in their shortcuts to the school, they might cross the path of a cranky boar and be attacked. It is believed that bread was baked in this oven for the pupils of the church school.



The Bread Oven

However, the oven may have been formerly of a different structure. The photograph below suggests that it was originally the chimney of a timber slab building (centre of photograph). This building, one of several hardwood slab buildings on the church grounds at that time, may have been used for worship prior to 1809 or perhaps as an early residence for the teacher prior to the building of the Schoolmaster's House in c.1817. The building also may have been used as a kitchen by the occupants of the Schoolmaster's House in later times.



It appears that the sandstone chimney of the slab building in the centre of the above photograph later became the bread oven. The Schoolmaster's House is to the right and the church far right.






