The message that Australia's oldest existing church, Ebenezer Church, is celebrating its bicentenary in 2009 is spreading. Our newsletters now reach an area extending from Perth in the west to Lower Hutt in the North Island of New Zealand in the east. Our local community leaders are also aware, Mayor Rex Stubbs announcing this coming event at the 2008 Hawkesbury Historical Society's Australia Day Dinner. And our website is up and running! The Cavanoughs held an enjoyable and successful reunion on a perfect day in March at Ebenezer and are planning to hold another one in 2009. Other reunions ahead are the Johnstons (*Now 20 Sept*) and Stubbs in 2008 and the Gronos and Arndells in 2009.

After an overload of paper work and approvals for restoration projects, we are now seeing some pleasing progress. A report is found later in this newsletter.

Our Bicentenary Committee has now met on two occasions and planning for the celebrations has commenced. Ideas being explored include:

- a national celebration that extends across denominations
- activities/re-enactments that highlight the importance of the river to the early settlers
- static historical displays being open for two or three days around 20 June 2009.





Historic Tree at Ebenezer Church

Ebenezer Church is 200 years old in 2009 but across the road from the church stands something much older still - the Historic Tree. It is believed that under the shade of this tree the pioneers of Ebenezer Church held their first services in 1803.

It is recorded on one occasion that the rebels who deposed Governor Bligh, believing that the settlers were friendly to the deposed Governor, issued instructions to the Military Commandant at Windsor, Lt Archibald Bell, to disperse or arrest the Ebenezer worshippers.

Accordingly, one Sunday morning Lieutenant Bell, with a detachment of troops, marched out of Windsor and proceeded to Ebenezer Mount at Portland Head. Arriving there he found the congregation gathered near the tree and engaged in worship led by James Mein. However the officer waited until the close of the service and then shook hands with Mein and with each member of the congregation in turn, and declared that he was satisfied with the orderly nature of the gathering and that he would neither disperse nor interfere with them in

any way.

Photographs taken in the 1950's show the tree at its greatest size. But by the 1980's several limbs had fallen, leaving a large opening in the trunk. Advice was sought on the tree's preservation and in keeping with the practices of the time the hole was plugged with foam. There followed a period of development of a new canopy and the tree appeared to be in a healthy state.

However, on 16 December 2005 a brief storm of cyclone intensity swept in a narrow band through Ebenezer. It snapped the entire canopy from the tree and dropped it across the roadway. Was this the end of this historic icon?

The historic tree is still alive! A branch low down on the main trunk had been developing vertically for some time and now its canopy is flourishing!

Isaiah Chapter 4 comes to mind: 'In that day the Branch of the Lord will be beautiful and glorious, and the fruit of the land will be the pride and glory....'

Like the tree, the life of Ebenezer Church will continue into its third century.



PROGRESS ON RESTORATION Church & Vestry

The roofs on the church and vestry were the focus of restoration work in January 2008. Broken slates were replaced and new lead flashing was installed. The slates on the porch roof were completely replaced.

This work was followed up by volunteer builders Bob Cross and Bob Palmer who replaced or repaired the barge boards on both buildings. The roof of the passageway between the church and vestry has also been renewed. All work has been approved by the Hawkesbury City Council's Heritage Advisor.





River Paddock Project



For some years now visitors to Ebenezer Church have not been able to enjoy the splendid view of the Hawkesbury River that the church site offers. This has been due to the infestation of weeds along the riverbank and the condition of the church river paddock. In January 2008 work commenced on the riverbank using funds obtained from a grant in 2006. At the same time, after obtaining approvals, many loads of validated fill were being brought in to make the area below the church a safer and more

attractive area for visitors. This has been achieved at little cost to the church.

The next task was to turf the area. After two weeks of postponement, the weather cleared and 31 volunteers swung into action. Starting at 8.00am, the goal was to lay 1800 square metres of turf by lunchtime. This was achieved – and a barbecue lunch was served – at 11 o'clock! A great team effort! And what a great result!

An Interesting connection....

Marie Larnach knew for some time that through her father she was a descendant of John Turnbull who came out on the Coromandel in 1802. Her father, Harry Turnbull, could trace his ancestry back to William Bligh Turnbull, son of John Turnbull.

Marie knew too that her mother was a descendant of a convict, John Bevan. It wasn't until Marie was researching her mother's family tree that she found out that John Bevan was on the same ship, the Coromandel! **That was in 1802**...but it wasn't until the marriage of Marie's father and mother - **in 1936** - that the two family lines, Turnbull and Bevan, connected!
